


OBITUARY HANS HENNING ROER

Dr. phil., Pharm. Rat, retired

Dr. Hans Henning Roer passed away suddenly at the age of 74 on the 29th of Feb. 2012.

For all collectors who knew him personally, he was one of the gentlemen of our hobby and an avid collector. For some, who had the pleasure to know him better, he was also a good friend and mentor in terms of old Lead Soldiers. He shared his knowledge and expertise to everybody, especially new collectors.

Dr. Roer's first book "Bleisoldaten" published in 1981 contained information on old lead figures produced in Germany and brought forth information previously not available to none Germanspeaking collectors. His second book, "Old German Toy Soldiers",



was issued in 1993 and found further International acclaim because of the multilingual text.

Playing with toy soldiers was his great passion. Under the old rules

of a "Table game" by Hausser Circa 1920 containing great scenes of past battles, alive with ancient Toy Figures.

Dr. Roer won many friends in the hobby as true gentleman in love with toy soldiers.

Everyone who knew him personally will remember his peculiar sense of humor and his friendly manner.

Our deepest sympathy to his wife Annie and their families.

Dr. Hans-Henning Roer will be sadly missed.

G.W. WOOD & CO. THE FORGOTTEN MANUFACTURER PART 2.

AND A VISIT TO THE NATIONAL ARCHIVES IN LONDON

In Part one of the **G.W. Wood** Story published in *Old Toy Soldier* Magazine Volume 35 # 4 Winter 2012 I documented the discovery that the British Camel Corp figure, previously attributed to companies other than **G.W. Wood** had in fact been produced by that company.

The information was based on the discovery of a figure with a printed number on the casting and my search at the National Archives in London proved that maybe there was a lot more to uncover both on Mr. Wood and possibly on other early toy soldier manufacturers before, during and immediately after World Way 1.

I visited the National Archives again in March 2012 and spent almost 5 days researching in the hope of finding more information on **G.W. Wood and Company**, my discoveries, as mentioned in the previous issue of OTS had led me to conclude that Mr. Wood was in fact a major player in toy soldier manufacturing business during those "Great War" years. Not having a registration number to work with the following system must be carried out.

March 2012 National Archives Discoveries. Note -Brushfield Manufacturing Company is henceforth referred to as BMC in this article.

My research to date in relation to **G.W. Wood** is as follows. The links between **Mr. Wood, BMC** (Brushfield Manufacturing Company) and John Hill are best described by the following time lines;


1912 BMC Incorporated in 1912 listed as in Kelly's London Post Office Directories as manufactures of leather goods - **no mention of Toy Soldiers.**

1913 G.W. WOOD Listed in *Directory of Toys and Games* Manufacturers as Metal Toy Manufacturers & Wholesalers. Address New North Road London.

1913. March, May and September

advertisements for **G.W. Wood** appear in *The Toy* and Fancy Goods Trader, a discovery made during earlier research at the British Museum Newspaper Library in Collindale London. Although these ads show the **G.W. Wood Mounted Cowboy** the design was not registered by the Board of Trade and allocated a number (615928) until December 15th 1913.

1913. March May and September the listings in these ads refer to, but do not illustrate other items available from G.W. Wood, which later appear in the undated **BMC** listings page see below.

1913 May 5th Indian Mounted on rearing Horse registered by Board of Trade on behalf of G.W. Wood (# 618584) This item has subsequently been found as part of a range of figures produced early post World War Two by **B&T** The Toys for Boys and can be viewed



in the relevant chapter in my book the Great Book of Hollow Cast Figures. B&T The Toys for Boys bought up post war moulds from defunct companies and provided mixtures in boxed sets and in profusion to Woolworths Stores in the UK. A similar Cowboy on a rearing horse it must be assumed, was originally a G.W. Wood product.











No further entries were found until ----

1917 January 15th. Disappointingly a pencil entry rather than a pen entry in the Board of Trade ledgers giving 5 design numbers for **BMC** could not turn up actual designs and with the entry being in pencil it seems designs were not registered.

Entries for all 3 companies in the National Archives ledgers stop after January 1917 as not all WW1 info was available for all companies according to the National Archives.

Further research needs to be carried out on my next visit to the National Archives to see if other designs for **G.W. Wood, BMC and Hill** are included before or after January 1917.



1915 G.W. Wood no longer listed in Directory of Toys and Games Manufacturers and Wholesalers as Metal To Manufacturers.

1915 to 1917 BMC listed in Kelly's London Post Office Directory as manufacturers of the BMC line of Metal Soldiers.

1918 Hill Incorporated "around" according to Companies House Cardiff UK but records destroyed. Incorporation # 153348

1918 -1921. BMC Brushfield Manufacturing Company Still listed but no mention of **BMC** range of Toy Soldiers

1921. No listing for BMC in Kellys London Post Office Directory.

1921 March. Soldarma, a trade name apparently used for BMC and sometimes used on boxed sets, was mentioned in an editorial in Games and Toys Magazine and listed as being exhibitors of Toy Soldiers at the British Industries Fair with over 200 models on view including Mexicans, Sailors, Belgian and French Soldiers, Marines. The article also states that Queen Alexandra purchased a box of soldiers from them. The address listed for the company being 12 Hyde Road Hoxton London and the Managing Director being listed as Mr. Pickford. **1921 July 12th The Soldarma Company**, a trade name used by **BMC** was reported in the London Gazette to have been voluntarily wound up.



SUMMARY SPECULATION

G.W. Wood joined his brother **FH Wood (Hill)** and was designing and registering for **BMC and Hill** after stopping production as **G.W. Wood and Co.**

The word superior appears on boxes by **G.W. Wood, BMC, Soldarma and Hill** providing another connection to all four companies

Several items by **Arthur Fry** - (See part three of this article in August OTS) are more in scale with **GW Wood / BMC** and could possibly have been made on his behalf by either company.

THE NATIONAL ARCHIVE SYSTEM

At this point it seems a good time to share and help unlock the key to navigating the National Archive System. One must first obtain a readers ticket and a carded ID before entering the vast reading rooms situated on two floors of the building. You must reserve a seat and desk which is yours for the duration of your visit.

The relevant information when searching for manufactures can be found by accessing the Board of Trade directories, which in turn give you access to the representations files or images, these being the original drawing, photo or item that was submitted when applying to register a design.

Using the computer records a Board of Trade code number for the date of the hand written ledger where each application was registered must be obtained and ordered. The retrieval system for each item takes about 40 minutes after you have found the number of the ledger that you require, you then must check the computer to see if your item had been retrieved and placed in a collection box linked to your seat location within the archives.

Ledgers are held on the first floor and can be picked up at a desk from the staff at which point you may browse the ledgers for as long as you wish before returning them. You may order three ledgers at a time, but only take one at a time to view.

In order to find the company names, which are recorded in date order, it's a case of paging through each large hard bound ledger. The hand written company name entries are random/by date and until you find the name of a company that interests you there is no way of knowing the design number. There is no index in the ledgers and no short cuts, it's simply a matter of going through each page of each ledger until something of interest shows up.

Once a design number is found listed against the company you are researching then note must be made of the number to enable you to return to the computer and order the relevant file where the design should be housed. Another 40 minutes at least goes' by for this to be retrieved before you actually get to look at the file and hopefully find the image of the design you want. It is slow and much patience and dedication is needed as it may be that there are no entries for what your searching for, so it's a case of back to square one and order another ledger and wait another 40 minutes etc etc.

Copies such as those illustrated in this article can be ordered from the reprographics department and emailed to you as digital images.

The National Archive building situated near Kew Gardens on the outskirts of London is a modern purpose built building with Museum, Cafe, Gift shop & restaurant, so there is plenty of opportunity to refresh and enjoy a coffee or a bite to eat whilst waiting for the documents to arrive in your retrieval box. The building is closed on Mondays and Public Holidays, it is open 9am to 5pm Monday, Wednesday and Saturday and 9am to 7pm Tuesday and Thursday.


Getting to Kew from central London is best by Underground or Tube as it is called, Take the Central Line to Richmond via Kew which is the second last stop, with an out of rush hour journey time being about 30 minutes.

Old Toy Soldier Auctions Issues a Call to Muster on June 2-3 for Major Offerings from the Collections of Bob Bailey and the Late K. Warren Mitchell

PITTSBURGH – ARMCHAIR generals and commanders of upscale bathtub fleets worldwide will show their firepower over the weekend of June 2-3 during a very special Old Toy Soldier Auctions event containing 1,200+ lots from several choice collections. Headlining the auction are soldiers from the collection of the late K. Warren Mitchell, plus the Bob Bailey collection of prewar Britains and other important properties from US and international consignors.

OTSA owner Ray Haradin described the headliner collections as "an excellent match, since each brings something distinctly different to the mix."

Bob Bailey, a Seattle collector who has been active in the toy soldier hobby his entire life, focused his efforts almost exclusively on early Britains. While working as a Pan Am flight attendant in the 1970s, Bailey wisely took advantage of his many layovers in London to scour the shops for

Britains productions.

The late K. Warren "Mitch" Mitchell, who was from Warren, Ohio, was a respected veteran dealer and collector who began his buying and selling adventures in the 1970s.

"Mitch sold actively at shows until about the last four or five years of his life, and for many years he had one of the most widely distributed specialty sales lists in the world. I know of many collectors who bought their first set of soldiers from him, and his longtime presence in the hobby has created a lot of interest in the pieces we will be selling from his collection," said Haradin.

Haradin added that around 100 additional lots from the Mitchell collection will be offered in OTSA's November sale, with yet another selection from the Mitchell trove to be offered under the joint banner of OTSA and Joseph Saine's Michigan Toy Soldier in a live, non-cataloged July 21 auction. Day one of the June 2-3 auction comprises approximate-

ly 700 lots of toy soldiers made prior to 1970. Day two will cover the production period from 1970 to present day.

Among the opening sessions' many desir-

able highlights from the Bailey collection is a prewar Britains boxed set 102. Made around 1920, the 33-piece assemblage includes Grenadier Guards, Scots Guards and Irish Guard

and is presented in a set box emblazoned with a spiffy gold and black printer's label depicting the British Army. It is estimated at \$3,000-\$4,000.

Also from the Bailey collection, there will be eight sets from Britains' 1940 Historical Series made expressly for FAO Schwarz toy store in New York. "Eleven sets were produced in total for the series. Basically, Britains designed the sets as samplers, choosing figures that were already included in other sets. Each figure is identified at the lower edge of the box below its particular slot. These sets are very rare, and to have eight of them in one collection is remarkable," said Haradin. The estimate range on the sets runs from \$1,800 to \$3,000.

One of the most exciting of the non-Britains sets entered in the June 2 session is a very scarce Timpo Ivanhoe set KN4. The coveted grouping of mounted figures includes Ivanhoe, Sir Brian De Bois Gilbert, and four others from the 12th-century Saxon warrior's inner circle. Haradin said he has only ever seen one other set and that the set to be auctioned is the first he has encountered that actually includes the Ivanhoe figure. Estimate: \$2,000-\$2,500.

Another lot that is expected to draw widespread interest is the exceptionally rare Cherilea Baseball set that includes the entire team plus umpire, housed in the original box. Ironically, the set was produced in England, where bats are meant for cricket, not baseball. Haradin explained that after World War II, many English companies were producing goods for the stronger American market. The Cherilea set could drive in a winning bid of \$1,500-\$2,000.

An ever-popular Buck Rogers set includes the space-

man's sidekicks and additional characters: Wilma, Ardala, Dr. Huer, the evil "Killer" Kane and robot Mekano Man. The appearance of a Buck Rogers set at auction always ignites a bidding war between Britains collectors and space toy enthusiasts. The six-piece ensemble is expected to reach \$2,500-\$3,500 on June 2.

A great surprise lies in wait for collectors who like to show off their figures in settings – four Johillco for British Midwest Importers display sets. They depict, respectively: Cowboy Town, Indian Camp, Beachhead, and Crusaders with Castle. Each set comes with its correct figures – ranging from nine figures with the Old West Cowboy Town to 14 each for Beachhead and Crusaders – and is estimated at \$800-\$1,200.

"We've had a lot of calls about the Johillco sets based solely on our preview brochure," said Haradin. "These particular display sets are very rarely seen. Previously, I had seen only one such set. Collectors love when rarities come out of the woodwork and they're able to vie for them in a public forum."

King & Country is a brand whose star keeps rising with collectors. In particular, buyers seem to favor glossy, pre-1990 examples. Fourteen sets of glossy figures will be sold on day one, with many additional King & Country lots earmarked for day two.

Collectors of German figures won't want to miss the Heyde Fall of Troy set (partial), with the Temple of Troy building and some of the key figures intact. Estimate \$2,000-\$3,000. Also by Heyde, a circa-1905 80mm largescale US Gun Team at the Halt includes two horses pulling a limbered wagon with cannon, and is led by an officer on



his mount. Considered one of the larger sets in that scale, it is entered with a \$3,500-\$4,500 estimate.

The opening session is rounded out with 20 mounted Lucotte French court figures, from a high-end range by Mignot CBG, est. \$200-\$400 each; 20 very fine Courtenay medieval knight figures, both mounted and unmounted, est. \$100-\$600; and a nice sampling of Lou Steinberg dime store figures.

Sunday's 500+ lots present a virtual panorama of contemporary toy soldiers. Highlights include a terrific lineup of 60 Mignot Napoleonic sets and a sampling of highly sought-after productions by Imperial, a New Zealand company that went out of business five years ago. Similarly, Zulu War sets by Welsh manufacturer Trophy are expected to find favor at auction. Trophy's production has scaled down, and older lines are becoming much more desirable now that they've been retired, Haradin noted.

Also poised to cross the auction block are East of India Samurai figures, Edmund's sets depicting Civil War regiments, many complete and with banners; and a large and diverse King & Country selection representing toy soldiers of every 20th and 21st century war, from World War I through the present-day Afghanistan War.

"There's so much more in this auction. My advice to collectors is to spend some time looking through the catalog. They're very likely to find things they've been looking for," Haradin said.

Old Toy Soldier's June 2-3 auction is an absentee, phone and Internet live bidding event that will commence at 10 a.m. Eastern Time on both days. Absentee bids, including those placed online via www.LiveAuctioneers.com, must be made no later than 24 hours prior to the sale in order to be accepted. Phone lines must be reserved no later than 24 hours prior to the sale in order to bid by phone as the auction is in progress.



HISTORICAL NOTE

Sir William Purdie Treloar was Lord Mayor of London when in 1907 he founded Treloars as a fund to aid cripples. In 1908 he founded his famous hospital in Alton, Hampshire, which has continued ever since as a leading provider of care for disabled young people. From the information on the lid of this box, it would seem that Sir William had set up 'Cripples Centres' in London prior to the opening of the Alton Hospital, and that they were doing their bit to raise funds by manufacturing one of that period's most popular toys, hollowcast lead soldiers. This endeavor was doubtless quite fun and good therapy for the young participants. Another charity well known to supply toy soldiers at this time was 'Lord Roberts Workshops'.

The venture cannot have lasted long, since this is the first surviving box to come to auction, nor have any of the figures been seen before in the collector market. The Household Cavalry figures are nicely designed, and the aiguillettes are in the mould and painted. Most unusually, the Royal Horse Guard head is different from that of the Life Guard, with the former depicting a plume that is flowing back from its support in a way that makes it distinct from any other model of the helmet.





SHOW REPORT

23RD ANNUAL WEST COASTER TOY SOLDIER AND MINIATURE FIGURE SHOW MARCH 11, 2012

As usual, several days prior to the Sunday, March 11th 2012, show, dealers arrived at the Irvine Marriott Hotel and set-up shop in their rooms. The traffic of collectors ebbed and flowed through the open doors of 42 rooms as bargains were found and deals struck. Saturday evening dealers faced the task of dismantling room displays and getting ready to move their wares into the first floor exhibit hall for the morning opening. The loss of an hour's sleep, because Daylight Saving Time would commence at 2 A.M. Sunday, did not seem of great concern.

Heralding the opening of the show at 9 A.M. Sunday, the skirl of bagpipes and the beat of a drum were heard as Woody Lambrith led a parade of re-enactors around the assembled dealer tables. Frank Cooper sang God Bless America and the doors were opened allowing the entry of the public.

The eager attendees found 71 dealers and 108 tables of figures and associated items. Vintage figures, both metal and plastic, were displayed. Many of these were mint in their original boxes. A multitude of loose figures in various conditions were available. Contemporary manufacturers offered an extensive variety of their products including newly released figures. A wide selection of books was offered by two or three dealers. Kits and materials with which to create dioramas were available from several dealers.

In the hallway, outside the entry to the exhibit hall, the re-enactors set up displays of their equipment along with dioramas relating to their organizations. One of the displays featured a WWI Vickers machine gun which attracted much attention.

Craig McClain said "Despite the economy slowing the hobby; collectors were buying." A majority of dealers told him that sales were better and that it was a good show.

On a different note several regulars were not able to attend this year's show due to personal commitments or illness. Craig has heard from them and that they looked forward to next year's West Coaster.

SHOW REPORT

THE SOUTH FLORIDA SHOW By Jack Matthews

On Sunday, January 29 I attended the 18th Annual Florida Toy Soldier, Action Figure, Toy and Collectibles Show held at the very large Scottish Rite Masonic Hall right outside Lake Worth, Florida. I've been going to regional toy soldier shows since the first two were held by our DC Club and MFCA in Philadelphia. Back then, of course, the venues were jammed with antique soldiers, 1930's and 40's toys and all sorts of ephemera. Many of us old timers built our collections that way.

Recently and not surprisingly, with a few exceptions, most of the items offered at small shows are of the new variety, with many dealers showing King & Country, Conte, Frontline, New Britains, Russians and similar excellent products. In recent years, the antiques have shown up less and less. But the South Florida Show was an exception and a very pleasant surprise.

My wife and I are spending the winter months in beautiful Sarasota, Florida going from high up in the Great Smokies of North Carolina to beautiful Tampa Bay. When we arrived a few months ago, I was delighted to find that my old friend Jim Alexander had lived here for twenty years. Jim was a "snail mail" list dealer in composition figures over thirty years ago and now, like many of us, sells and buys on eBay. After having a great reunion with Jim and his son, Jim Jr., another avid collector, we took the easy three hour drive around Lake Okeechobee to Lake Worth.

Expecting the usual recent show offerings and attending mainly to renew some old hobby friendships, we were in for a very nice surprise. Arriving early afternoon the day before the Show, we found dealer setup well underway. Early Saturday evening we were all treated to a free sit-down dinner of home-made Italian sausage, cole slaw, potato salad and yummy desserts. Wow!

We spent a wonderful show day on Sunday amazed at the availability of old Britains, Dimestore, Heydes, many old toys and to my delight a bunch of the WWII "paper" cardboard cut-out and punchout sets that I collect. Frankly, I haven't seen any at a regional show in years. I went home with a large MIB set of cutouts by Saalfield at a very low price, several Saalfield Mint Punch out soldier and sailor booklets from seller Steven Smiles, a box for the large pre-war colorful Marx Sparkling Doughboy Tank and two boxed sets of WWII Air Recognition Models. Alan Kelsey, one of the great model makers in the hobby had a table full of his marvelous creations, offered at terrific prices. I bought three. Alan had a marvelous 54mm WWII English Pub building with a removable roof and figures inside for sale. I was very tempted.

When I asked John Lesinski, Show Co-chairman about the show's low prices for such older treasures, he opined that many of the large club's members, like all of us who are aging, were culling out their treasures.

Many older readers will recall John's now-rare solidcast early German and US dreadnaughts, Indian Elephant Mountain Battery and other items sold at the Widener and Valley Forge MFCA Shows. Just a few of each were made, and if you didn't get to his table by 8:30am during setup, you were out of luck. John's prize creation this year was the 40mm Boxer Rebellion semi-round diorama. I bought it on sight, beating my friend, former Federal Judge Tom Scott to the punch.

Hobby Bunker had several tables filled with its usual goodies as did regional show dealer Hank Horn, Alan Gwin who has been doing this for years had many tables of older goodies. I snapped up a great New Era Dimestore German Band conversion from him for five bucks each.

New to me was the very affable owner of Crown Toy Soldiers who had several tables of marvelous offerings, including a large Western Stagecoach. I bought three of his Spanish-made Blackhawk medieval knights. I plan on ordering more through his website, www. crowntoysoldiers.com

Figures entered by Club Members in the painting competition were less than one usually sees but were of excellent workmanship. Curtis Slight, Club Historian, collector, painter and long-time hobby writer displayed a neat piece.

At 130 tables and fifty dealers, this is a large regional show. The Club went out of its way to make everyone feel welcome. Where else can you get a free, tasty pre-show "Appreciation Dinner", catered by Tony Angecara, Show Founder and Chef? The Club's cochairmen Mike Skurda and John Lesinski are to be congratulated on putting on a fine weekend. While South Florida is a bit off the Toy Soldier trail, it's a great way for "snowbirds" to sneak in a hobby "fix" during a sunny mid-winter vacation.



ABOVE THE BATTLEFIELD PART I: PRE-1918 GERMAN-MADE AIRSHIP SETS

By Earl Jorgensen

In the early afternoon of Nov. 21, 1783, two human passengers were lifted high above Paris in a wicker basket dangling beneath a huge balloon filled with hot smoke. Once airborne they set about feeding bundles of straw into an onboard fire pit (which prevented the smoke from cooling) and applying wet sponges to the flaming embers landing on the balloon's surface. The balloon was the latest experiment conducted by Joseph-Michel and Jacques-Etienne Montgolfier, brothers

obsessed with the dream of human flight. The 25 minute flight covered a distance of nine kilometers before returning its soot-covered "aeronauts" to the earth. Among those witnessing the event was Benjamin Franklin who later referred to the flight as "a discovery of great importance. . . .Convincing sovereigns of the folly of wars may perhaps be one effect of it."¹

France established the world's first air force, the *Compagnie d' Aerostiers*, on Apr. 2, 1794. On the morning of June 26, the French commander, Gen. Marlot, ascended high above the battlefield of


L'Entrepenant. He remained airborne for the duration of the battle, carefully observing the deployment of the Austrian forces and redeploying his troops to counter their movements with orders which were dropped to the ground attached to sandbags. While the defeated Austrians accused the French of violating the rules of war, the French acknowledged the important role the balloon played in the victory, comparing an army without a balloon to a "duelist fighting blindfolded."² The *Compagnie* was quickly expanded and, in 1797, several balloon units

accompanied Napoleon to Egypt during his Nile Campaign. As fate would have it, the transport ship carrying their equipment was sunk by the British before it could be off-loaded and, upon his return to Paris in 1799, Napoleon ordered the unit disbanded. Observation balloons would not be deployed over another battlefield until the American Civil War.

In June of 1861, Professor Thaddeus Lowe was appointed Chief Aeronaut of the newly formed Union Army Balloon Corps, a civilian aeronautical unit attached to the Army of the Potomac. The unit served with distinction throughout McClellan's Peninsula Campaign of 1862, providing valuable intelligence, directing artillery fire and even conducting experiments with air-to-ground telegraph communications. On Nov. 7, 1862, McClellan was replaced by Gen. Burnside who preferred to rely on the traditional "eyes on the ground" intelligence provided by the cavalry. Thaddeus Lowe, often referred to as the "most shot at man in the Civil War,"³ resigned his post in April, 1863, and the Union Army Balloon Corps was officially disbanded a few months later.

Burnside's failure to recognize the potential of military observation balloons was not shared by his European counterparts. France re-established its military aeronautical corps in 1877 and was quickly followed by Germany in 1884. Great Britain acquired its first balloon in 1879. Ironically, it was originally produced for the Union Army Balloon Corps by none other than Professor Thaddeus Lowe.

Military interest in aeronautics was not, however, limited to the observation balloon. In the mid-19th century, a new type of balloon with the potential capability of navigating through the sky under its own power was introduced. The craft was referred to as the dirigible balloon. Unlike observation balloons which either drifted with the wind or were held in place by cables connected to the ground, dirigibles were equipped with rudders for steering and onboard engines to power the craft through the sky.

The first dirigible flight took place on Sept. 24, 1852, in a craft powered by a small coal-fired steam engine. The craft successfully flew a 17 mile course in slightly over three hours but strong headwinds forced the return flight to be cancelled. Controlled powered flight or the ability to fly against the wind was finally achieved in 1884 by the *La France*, a battery powered dirigible. In 1887, a dirigible powered by a gasoline fueled internal combustion gasoline engine designed by Gottlieb Daimler was successfully tested. Daimler patented his engine design and started commercial



production. In spite of the fact that dirigibles were undependable, prone to catch fire and occasionally known to collapse mid-flight, they were quickly adapted for military use.

On July 2, 1900, Count Ferdinand von Zeppelin introduced a revolutionary new dirigible design. The 420 ft. craft utilized a rigid internal aluminum support structure enclosing seventeen hydrogen gas cells. Although his first design, designated LZ-1, was declared "unsuitable for neither military or civilian purposes"⁴ by a government commission, von Zeppelin persevered, finally achieving success with his third design, designated LZ-3, in 1907. The craft was purchased by the German military in 1908 and used for training.

While the details surrounding the first German-made Luftschiffer-Abteilung (Airship Battalion) set of toy soldiers remain elusive, the industry-wide standard of producing sets that were "almost as up to date as contemporary newspapers"⁵ would indicate that it was assembled shortly after the military established its first airship units. The earliest reference to an airship set I was able to locate was a "Balloon section, complete with wagons, bicycles, trees, etc."6 offered in a 1902 mail-order catalog from the British firm of A.W. Gamage, Ltd. The fact that the description includes a bicycle offers an additional tool for dating the set. Germany was known to have first experimented with possible military applications of the bicycle during the Autumn Military Maneuvers of 1891,⁷ providing the earliest possible production date for the set.

Additional information can be gleaned from published photos of surviving *Luftschiffer-Abteilung* sets and illustrations of sets offered in turn-of-thecentury toy catalogs. It appears that the *Luftschiffer* designation was utilized throughout the industry for all types of balloon sets, including dirigibles and zeppelins. It also appears that the majority of dirigibles and zeppelins offered in the sets were equipped with ceiling hooks and rudimentary drive mechanisms designed to produce motion, characteristics normally associated with tin toys. German companies such as Marklin. Bing and Meier produced toys from shapes stamped out of thin sheets of tin-plate, bent into shape and held together with tabs. The toys were often equipped with either simple string wound motors or more technical clockwork-driven motors. Inexpensive, mass-produced tin toy dirigibles and zeppelins would "rise up and down on pulleys and string, their propellers turning as they did so."8 Much as Heydemade sailors enhanced warships made by Bing and Marklin-made brass cannons enhanced large scale field artillery units made by Heyde, the movement and motion provided by simple tin toys enhanced the appeal of the Luftschiffer-Abteilung sets of toy soldiers.

The airship sets were supported by assorted figures representing a variety of military personnel which often appear to be selected at random. Historically, military dirigibles did not become fully operational until 1908. Sets produced prior to that date basically represent a group of soldiers guarding and/or watching an airship while sets produced after the date began to represent an actual military supporting

the airship. Figures representing communications (often in the form of signal flags), mounted couriers (which were replaced by bicycles and motorcycles) along with officers observing through oversized telescopes (later replaced by binoculars) are present in all sets. Later sets introduced figures of mechanics (with oilcans and large fuel containers) and members of the flight crew wearing warm flight jackets. Additional figures of lancers, machinegunners and assorted riflemen were often included as was an assortment of scenery (trees, shrubs and wheat sheaves) and equipment such as wagons, motorized vehicles and tents. Since sets could easily be expanded by simply adding additional scenery and equipment, they often were quite elaborate as seen in the following description of the Luftschiffer-

Abteilung No 737 set by Georg Hevde. "A tin Zeppelin capable of carrying four miniature crew members, eighteen ground figures as well as two cyclists and five hedges and trees. The airship was movable by a propeller. In addition there was both a station of carrier-pigeons and a signal-flag service."9 One can only wonder what additional Luftschiffer sets may have been produced had the world not gone to war in the late Summer of 1914.

The war both isolated German toy soldier manufacturers from

their highly profitable export markets and severely limited the industries access to raw materials. Since toy soldiers were thought to promote the development of virtues such as national pride, love of country and patriotism in children, the German toy soldier industry was given access to sufficient raw materials to continue a limited production of sets designed specifically to reinforce the public's support for the war effort. A listing found in the 1915 catalog for the firm on Leipziger Lehrmittelanstalt von Dr. Oskar Schneider of Leipzig describes a Luftschiffer-Abteillung set which includes both a clockwork zeppelin-airship along with an automobile, an airship troop, a General Stall officer, a 14 figure military unit and assorted scenery.



World War I gave the world its first opportunity to observe and evaluate the military effectiveness of the airship. Observation balloons were deployed in great numbers by both sides and once again proved their ability to direct artillery fire with the same deadly accuracy previously demonstrated in the American Civil War. France and Great Britain quickly realized that their small fleets of semi-rigid dirigibles were far too slow and vulnerable to be deployed as offensive weapons and quickly re-assigned them to naval operations where they excelled in anti-submarine warfare. Germany first introduced its new military zeppelin during the annual military maneuvers of 1909. Included in the demonstration was a scripted encounter between an airplane and the zeppelin. The underpowered airplane was unable to reach the altitude of the zeppelin, thus proving that the airplane was unsuitable for military purposes and that the zeppelin not only provided the capability of long range aerial reconnaissance and strategic aerial bombing, but was seemingly invincible.

Although German zeppelins did achieve some success early in the war, advancements in antiaircraft weapons and the introduction of incendiary ammunition fired from the machine-guns of high flying airplanes soon drove them from the sky. By late 1916, surviving zeppelins were withdrawn from offensive duties and were replaced by large, multiengine aircraft designated as bombers and, in the end, the battlefield was lifted into the sky on the wings of the airplane.


LES FIGURINES EN PLOMB CREUX TOME 3

By Jean Bernard Doublet and Jean-Michel Tisne Reviewed by Russ Bednarek

Following the success of their first two volumes, authors M.Doublet and M.Tisne have released their long-awaited third book examining the work of French hollow-cast manufacturers. The newest release explores the products of C.B.G., D.C., S.R., and X.R. The authors continue to adhere to their successful format of informative text supported by a truly immense number of color photographs displaying the products of each manufacturer.


The companies examined in this study existed from the 1920's to late 1950's. It was during this period that diverse materials were introduced, experimented with, and utilized in toy soldier production. Aluminum, with it's almost indestructible quality, was first used in the 1930's. Unfortunately the drawback to this medium was that detail was difficult to replicate in the castings, and paint adhesion was less than desirable. Later, plastic was introduced, a less expensive material that could be readily painted. To adapt to the ever shifting consumer trends of the toy soldier market, companies commonly used the same mold for their hollow-cast, aluminum and plastic figures to save time and expenses. This practice of multi-material production often makes figure identification confusing and difficult for the collector. When applicable, the authors clearly identify such figures utilizing a color coded numbering system, the color corresponding to the material used in the figure's production.

Identifying French hollow-cast figures can be a frustrating and extremely difficult task. Numerous companies ventured into the toy soldier market, many producing figures of diverse materials. To further complicate things, many companies stole from each other, be it creating figures to compete with a competitor's popular line, or literally re-casting a competitor's figure with a minor change. These practices further complicate attempts to document a company's production. The most reliable resources for research are original boxed sets bearing the



company's name/logo and catalogues. Collectors are treated to several pictures of boxed sets and multiple catalogue pages, the most numerous being color pages from the Tobler catalogue. Tobler was a manufacturer of chocolate that employed a promotional system of hollow-cast figures produced by D.C. Included with each Tobler chocolate bar was a stamp of a numeric value. The stamps could then be redeemed for D.C. figures, each figure requiring a specific number of "points" for redemption. Tobler had several different sized figures produced for their promotions, all of which are thoroughly examined. Color photographs of the catalogue and the corresponding figures are presented for study.

BOOK REVIEW (Cont.)



Collectors will find the chapter concerning S.R. (Simon et Rivollet) most interesting. S.R. was well known for their horse drawn artillery teams. In addition to the artillery teams, field kitchens and various military horse drawn wagons were created. To cater to the collector, the vehicles appeared in four different sizes, with some guns available in up to seven different scales. To compliment the common field artillery pieces, siege and fortress cannons were also produced. The sheer number, type and scale of S.R. products can be overwhelming to the collector, but with the numerous color photographs and supplementary text, one can successfully navigate the identification of an S.R. piece.

"Les Figurines en Plomb Creux 3" encompasses more than hollow-cast figures of of the French Army. Foreign armies, Wild West, Circus, Sports, Civilian, Farm and Historical figures are also examined. There is a short chapter dealing with several smaller manufacturers and another presenting newly discovered figures that belong in the two previous books. Readers are also treated to nine pages of color photographs of figures, *"non identifiees"*, that are sure to be of great interest to collectors. The quality of "Les Figurines 3" is consistant with the two previous books; outstanding. Printed on glossy, heavy paper, it is 238 pages, with almost one thousand color photographs, that will delight enthusiasts not only of French hollow-cast production, but hollowcast collectors in general. Offered in a traditional binding, a spiral bound version is also available. My personal preference is the spiral bound version. Not only is it larger in size, but the spiral bound edition offers collectors the advantage to lay open any page of any volume to compare figures of different makers. Considering the amount of information plus the quality and quantity of color photographs, I highly recommend this book to all toy soldier collectors.



BOOK REVIEW

The Barclay Catalog Book & The Second Catalog Book

Richard O'Brien has combined his two, excellent, long out of print Dimestore reference books listed in the heading and had them republished into a single volume. It is an absolute must for any serious Dimestore collector. While both of the original books, published in 1985 and 1986 respectively were 13 inches by 8-1/2 inches, the new book is in 8 X 10 format.

The Barclay Catalog book section is 56 pages in length and contains catalog pages of most Barclay figures and vehicles along with photos of some prototype items that were never produced. Several very scarce items such as No. 365 Streamline (Zephyr) train and No. 151 Baby Crib with doll along with many boxed sets and several"Paint Your Own Army" sets are pictured and are not found in any other reference book including <u>Collecting American Made Toy Soldiers</u>.

The Second Catalog Book section is also 56 pages long and features original catalog pages from Manoil, Beton, Authenticast, Warren, All-Nu (Faben) Grey Iron and concludes with Barclay's post war items such as the super rare No. 390 Fire Engine with Climbing Fireman, their podfoot series and the small die cast vehicles of the 1960's that were Barclay's production "swan song".

I have used my copies of the two, original catalog books over the years to identify Dimestores that were not pictured or listed in any other volume or periodical. I hope that your review of this fine reference piece will also provide you with some answers to your own long-standing Dimestore puzzles and questions.





J.S.H., THE MYSTERIOUS ILLUSTRATOR



By Joe Wallis

I have written this article to correct the often held misconception that all prewar illustrated box labels were drawn by Fred Whisstock. Whisstock, who lived from 1878 to 1943, designed over 140 box labels for Britains sets between about 1908 (or 1909) and 1930. Some of his labels continued in use until 1950. (For information on Fred Whisstock, including his obituary, see my 1997 article in Old Toy Soldier, Volume XXI, Issue Number 3, pages 23-25.) Collectors have long been captivated by Whisstock's artwork, although the vignettes that he drew sometimes demonstrated artistic license and inaccurately portrayed the pose adopted by the set's contents. (For example. Set #11 Black Watch Highlanders is charging, not marching as his label depicted it.) This may have caused occasional complaints from the firm's more fastidious customers. In addition, the style and lettering were probably seen by the Britains firm to be rather "behind the times" by the 1930s.

A generic "Armies of the World" box label was introduced for newly issued sets by 1933, but Whisstock boxes continued to be used for most of the previous sets that had them. In fact a few of his labels were reemployed for new sets: Set #1730 Royal Artillery Gunners and Set #1894 Royal Air Force adapted Whisstock's labels for Sets #313 and #240, respectively. However, there were at least eightand possibly six additional-Britains sets that were given dramatic and impressive new labels during the period 1933-35 designed by an illustrator who only signed his work with the initials "J.S.H." in tinv letters (compared to Whisstock's full name on the left side of the many labels he designed). J.S.H. was as good an artist as his predecessor, but only a few of his labels survived in use past 1941. If Whisstock sometimes drew scenes that featured poses not in the

set, J.S.H. consistently produced attractive drawings that did not comport with the set contents.

The eight box labels which contain the initials of J.S.H. include: Set #1 Life Guards, Set #32 Royal Scots Greys, Set #128 12th Lancers, Set #150 North American Indians on foot, #152 North American Indians on horses, #159 Territorial Yeomanry, and #1258/#1307 Knights in Armor (which both used the same jousting scene). There are five more box labels that appear to be very much in the style of J.S.H., but lack his initials. These labels are: Set #15 Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders charging, Set #24 9th Lancers, Set #30 Drums and Bugles of the Line, Set #33 16th/5th Lancers, Set #127 4th/7th Dragoon Guards, and Set #1257 Yeomen of the Guard. I believe that the label for Set #1257 was the first one drawn by JSH, and that when he was asked by Britains to design more, the artist began to insert his initials in several subsequent box labels.

For the previously existing boxes with set numbers under 160, all but Set #15 had previously made use of Whisstock labels. The likely motivation for replacing the Whisstock labels for Sets #1, #33 and #127 was the need to reflect the changed regimental titles resulting from the 1922 reorganization of the British Army; this reduced 31 cavalry regiments to only 22 regiments by merging many units, including the 1st and 2nd Life Guards, the 16th Lancers and the 5th Lancers, as well as the 4th Dragoon Guards and the 7th Dragoon Guards. Britains did not follow through with redesigning the label for the 17th Lancers. which had merged with the 21st Lancers-probably because Set #81's 17th Lancers were dressed in the uniform they wore at the

battle of Ulundi in the Zulu War of 1879. Britains also never retitled Set #99 13th Hussars as the 13th/18th Hussars, nor Set #106 6th Dragoon Guards as the 3rd/6th Dragoon Guards.

Besides replacing the labels for merged regiments, Set #15 Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders had only had a "Printer's label" with battle honors, and it made sense to give it an illustrated box label. A desire for more dramatic scenes must have stimulated the replacement of Whisstock labels for Sets #24, #32, #33, #128, and #159. The North American Indian sets (#150 and #152) were given labels of a higher standard of artwork than Whisstock had devoted to them; probably to make them more likely to attract customers during the Great Slump when Britains was scrambling to maintain its sales.

Sets #15, #127, #128, and #159 were discontinued after 1941. For those sets which remained in the postwar catalogs, the new labels introduced in the 1930s that are discussed here survived until the early 1950s for Set #33 16th/5th Lancers, Set #150 Indians on foot, Set #152 Indians on horses, and Set #1307 Knights in Armor, while the J.S.H. labels for Set #1 Life Guards, Set #30 Drums and Bugles of the Line, and Set #32 Royal Scots Greys lasted a few more years. Set #24 9th Lancers was sold in a box with the illustrated label for several years after the set's revival in 1954. The Yeomen in Set #1257 were offered in a box with a Historical Series label when it reappeared in the postwar Britains catalog in 1952—this label was shared with other sets such as the Waterloo Infantry of Set #1518 and the Knights of Agincourt on foot of Set #1664. (All photographs for this article are of boxes from my collection except for Sets #150 and #152, which Dr. Robert Cerwin loaned to me.)

Britains may have found new labels an extra expense whose impact on sales was hard to assess. In the end, generic Regiments of All Nations labels would prevail in the 1950s and cellophane-fronted boxes in the 1960s. Perhaps a reader of this article will be able to identify the full name of J.S.H. from other 1930s illustrations besides the toy soldier box labels that he did. If not, J.S.H. will remain the mysterious illustrator who succeeded Fred Whisstock and drew some excellently done Britains box labels.

ROGER ALLEN JOHNSON 1932-2009 DREAMT OF DIMESTORES THAT NEVER WERE... AND IMAGINATIVELY SAID WHY NOT!

My Toy Soldier Hobby Was Always Gratifying

From its beginning the veracious axiom of sales and marketing has forever productively been, "Tell your story to enough prospects and someone will always say... Yes."

For the past few years, I have been writing about Dimestore soldier

producers, large and small, that rose to fill the void when the several majors ran out of road to kick the can down. After every article, it's been a consistent search for the next bonvivant name and a soldiering story yet to unfold. Sometimes that name has been unconscionably overlooked.

The cold salty skin moister quickly disappeared as soon as I began reading the review I received about a recent soldier show on a college campus in Hackensack, NJ.

My friend Roger Dubois wrote, "While at the Show discussing Dimestores with a few 'old timers' the name Roger Johnson came up. One in the group knew he was from Metuchen, NJ, had made great toy soldier conversions, and sadly passed away not too long ago. I think I met him, however, it was very early in my hobby years and the name regrettably left me.

"I do remember from our recent correspondence your comment about running out of special Dimestore production people about whom to write.

"Anyway, upon returning home, I went online and searched for the obit of Roger Johnson, attempting to learn more. I was amazed to find out just how much this man had accomplished. He was definitely a generous man with many hobby talents.

"So you might wish to consider one more biography as another genesis or even an end to your anthology of OTS articles.

"Fortunately, I have been able to see some photographs of his workmanship and have a tremendous respect for his creativity in the fabrication of many fascinating Dimestore conversion pieces.

"I now regard Roger Johnson as one of the pioneers in the hobby of converting Dimestore toy soldier figures."

Since the passing of Roger Johnson a few years ago, I am certainly lucky to acquire data from some of his industry friendships and from those that have collected his soldier creations as well as from his genteel wife, Marilyn.

Nowadays, the once Dimestore collecting universe by past standards has drastically shrunk to the likes of a specialized neighborhood. However, the conversion of Dimestore toy soldiers has taken on the personality of a new art form. Thus, a different kind of current collectible demand has originated. It coat-tails nicely to the older originals.

Well, when first thinking about whom to contact for some input regarding Roger, I must begin with the person that influenced my own obsessive penchant to pursue the reconfiguring of aged, castoff Dimestore toy soldier figures.

A Grand Poobah in the toy soldiering hobby; a Master figure producer himself; a scholarly aficionado of Dimestore militaries'....none other than my longtime friendly potentate, Ed Poole.

Ed wrote, "Lou, I'm so glad you're doing an article about Roger Johnson. Roger responded in 1980 to an article I wrote in *OTSN* on WWII military vehicle kit models.

"This began a long enthusiastic correspondence. Throughout the years we did lots of swaps and traded many items, mostly soldier conversions. Roger had a lively imagination and, because he

possessed splendid modeling skills, he was able to put his ideas into creating great figures.

"Roger and I collaborated on two articles in 1994 and 2000 for *Toy Soldier Review*. Both returned us to our first mutual interest, tanks from old wood kits. He supplied the tanks for me to photograph. The crew and accessories were from my line of 5 and 10 Corps."

There is still a mention or so of Ed and Roger that I wish to relate when the later years of his illness became the topic.

I then approached Verne Johnson and asked him if he could forward me with a thought or so of Roger to include within this remembrance. He came forward with recall and kindness.

Verne stated, "Roger was the third person I became acquainted with in the toy soldier fraternity. He was the best mentor a new collector could have wished for, very sharing of his time and knowledge of all things to do with toy soldiers.

"Roger was always on the hunt for the unknown and the unrecorded Dimestore figure. His flea-

market travels and collectibles shows allowed him the opportunity to look under many tables asking each dealer about the odd toy soldiers they might have. More often than not he would come home with a new find.

"I think that as Dimestore toy soldiers began to become scarce because of the growing numbers of collectors, Roger's interests also changed. He developed a strong desire for continuing the lines of Barclay and Manoil."

I am told that this is the period when he began his serious fabrication of new toy soldier conversions never produced by the stale and musty regimes that before had ruled the market for so many years.

When asking Bill Lango about Roger, he had this to say, "Roger was very sophisticated and expressed a most likeable demeanor. At the shows, Roger's table-top-displays were very presentable and always orderly in a most inspiring way for his potential buyers.

"He knew the ins and outs of salesmanship and connoted them from his years working in advertising and marketing agencies.

"I remember one year, when Roger had the beginning of some illness, that I went down to his home, picked him up and off we drove to the big Miniature Figure Collectors of America Show at Valley Forge, PA. Roger, as always, found a bunch. The return trip was lots of laughs. He was in every respect surely an asset to our hobby."

In returning to Verne, another E-mail of his offered this aside, "When Roger began his earnest plunge into Dimestore conversions, he challenged himself to produce a Royal Canadian Mounted Police. He combined several cut-up figures into one. It was important that the R.C.M.P. maintained the look of an original piece, as if done by Barclay. His painting of all his military production was so exact as to march undetected along with the regular troops. He believed that if Barclay had made that Mountie, the kids of the era would have a buying frenzy.

"Roger enjoyed inviting you to guess what original figures went into one of his conversions. Many figures joined two to four parts of various originals.

"I am happy that Roger is being remembered and so recognized for the wonderful person that he was and for his part in introducing his Dimestore conversions to the toy soldier world and thus becoming part of that recorded history." It is most pleasing to have accepted the memories of Roger from his hobby friends. Nevertheless, near the end of all the forgoing conversations I was asked this inquiry, "Have you talked to Charlie Breslow?"

No not yet. Marilyn emailed the phone number.

Although Charlie was recovering from several strokes, he was glib enough to speak at length about his long term friendship with Roger. Most of all, he took much quavering time to write me the following:

"It was the summer of '75, while I was shopping at the Chester, New Jersey flea-market, that I passed a table displaying my special interest, toy soldiers.

"The vendor, a man in his 30's, was friendly, interesting and was Roger Johnson.

"Having talked away the afternoon, then exchanging phone numbers, this began decades of a long friendship.

"When I first invited Roger to my home, he brought along a few new soldier creations for show-andtell that he had made from causalities in his own collection. They became the beginnings of my

approximately hundred piece collection of R. J. conversions....perhaps, the largest grouping of his creations.

"Any collector will attest to the difficultly in shopping with someone who hunts for the same things you do. But, Roger and I always managed to amicably 'divvy-up' the treasures.

"Here's an interesting Rogerism. He had an uncanny ability to describe what he wanted to find on any day we shopped. I recall him saying, 'I want to get these Barclay Boy Scouts today!'

"Wow...Gee by Gosh by Golly!! He found all of them that day! With Roger's skills, any repairs were no problem.

"Over the years, we traveled, attended and setup together at too many various collectible shows to mention. Roger was constantly motivated by bits and pieces to create interesting Dimestore conversions that never were. He always felt they should have been produced by the 'Big Guys.'

"Somehow I did not understand why he never signed his work. I often told him. But he never did.

"With Rogers passing, I lost one of my oldest and closest friends. The hobby lost an unsung 'Giant!'

"Roger accomplished what so many strive for but few attain. He lives on through his work. He will always be remembered by me and within the hobby.

"Roger, I miss you and cherish you. Your devoted friendCharlie."

While coordinating soldier information from friends of Roger, I was most elated to have spoken on several occasions to his wife, Marilyn, of almost fifty-five years. She graciously answered many questions and filled me in on some details.

Roger graduated Princeton University in the class of 1954. Unable to attend the 50th Reunion of his Class, since he had developed a progressive neurological condition, he dictated to Marilyn a brief bio for its submission into the Class Program, *Lives of '54*.

Quoted from that text: " Upon graduating, three years were spent during the Korean War in the U. S. Navy as a Lieutenant supply officer on a sub

tender and destroyer, and then followed by a career in advertising and marketing, marked by a variety of executive positions.

"Marilyn at that time taught sociology at Rutgers and researched women in politics at the Eagleton Institute. Two memorable years were spent in Germany where I worked for a subsidiary of Grey Advertising and where Marilyn did her dissertation research out of the University at Cologne."

Interestingly, Roger also created and published five children's board games. Two of them *Sub Search* and *Tank Battle* became national-sales leaders.

Marilyn mentions and advised me, "no need to be shy about alluding to Roger's illness in your article as the last fifteen years of his life were affected, slightly at first then increasingly severely. His disability devastated the amount and quality of his conversions; as well as, his ability to read, write and navigate on his own.

"Marilyn continues, "During those fifteen years I was his caregiver. His room at home and our recreation room was decorated with Dimestore toy soldiers and vehicles. The walls were covered with WWII posters and prints. He repeatedly asserted and insisted that they all came from Ed Poole.

"Roger's final year was in a nursing home. I took him home every day to visit and play with his beloved poodle, Bertie, and his large miniature Army. At 76 the Lord took Roger."







PROTOTYPE OF MANOIL'S NO. 702 COUPE

Our friends, Karl and Sheryl Thuman from upstate New York, who are avid Dimestore collectors, recently made a terrific addition to their collection. They acquired the original prototype, along with the U.S. Patent application and drawings, as submitted by Jack Manoil in 1935, for MANOIL's two-piece auto, NO. 702 – COUPE.


The prototype is slush cast, probably because MANOIL did not want to go to the expense of creating dies for die casting until the patent was approved. But die casting was the target process since the text of the application states in part "... directed toward toy automobiles which may be made out of cast material preferably by a die casting process." The patent application describes a two-part vehicle comprised of a chassis and body that was intended to be taken apart and reassembled easily, for play. Some early cast iron toy autos also had this feature.

As shown in the photo of the top view of the chassis and in figure 1 on sheet 1 of the patent drawing, the chassis contained a detailed 8-cylinder engine, drive train and gas tank (#20) that was visible when the body was removed. This certainly was intended to attract the attention of aspiring young auto mechanics and hopefully sell lots of toy cars.

The patent drawings show the smooth outline of the body of the slush cast prototype but the gray extension lines around the perimeter of the body render much sharper corners as is seen on die cast production models of NO. 702. Another major difference between the prototype and the die cast production models is that the prototype has large, square air vents in the engine cowling whereas the production model has narrow, cast, vents as shown on the patent drawings.

We can only speculate as to the possible reasons for the major differences that occurred in the production model. The patent application goes into great detail to describe how the body could be attached and detached easily from the chassis. I believe that this attachment concept failed in practice and that the die cast "catches" that held the 2-parts together broke off rather easily. If true, then the obvious decision would have been to drop the attachment/ detachment feature and to permanently assemble the body to the chassis, which is what they did. Having made this decision, it no longer made sense to go to the expense of casting the detailed engine, drive train and gas tank since they would not be visible in the permanently assembled car.

Lastly, an original catalog page of all four models of MANOIL'S NO. 70X, two-piece vehicles lists the various available colors for this series but the color of the prototype is not one of them. Too bad because I like the yellow color the best.



NO.702 – COUPE







CHASSIS TOP VIEW

CHASSIS BOTTOM VIEW



The present invention relates to toy vehicles and is more particularly directed toward toy automobiles which may be made out of cast metal preferably by a die casting process. These toys consist

5 principally of two castings, one a chassis forming casting and and the other a body simulating casting. Axles and wheels complete the assembly of the toy vehicle.

The present invention contemplates toy vehicles 10 of this class wherein the chassis part and body

- 10 of this class wherein the chassis part and body forming part may be detachably secured together and held against separation or relative movement by means entirely independent of the axles. The preferred form of detachable coupling means for
- 15 securing these parts together includes catch members integral with the side walls of the body forming member and arranged to pass through the chassis forming member and hook against it so that the two parts will not separate. When the body forming part of the toy is in the form of
- 20 die casting, the resiliency of the thin side walls (which may be constructed by die cast methods) makes it possible to permit pressing in these side walls sufficiently to accomplish the inter-engagement of the catch members and chassis.
- By employing the quick detachable catch arrangement above referred to, it is possible to design the toy so that the wheels and axles may be completely carried by either the chassis part or 30 by the body part, and the other part need not bear
- 30 on the axles as has been customary in certain toys.

The present invention also contemplates a construction of toy automobiles whereir the wheels

- 35 and axles are carried by the chassis portion so that the body portion may be completely disconnected from the chassis portion whereupon the chassis portion becomes exposed to view. This chassis portion may constitute a complete toy
- 40 vehicle. It is preferably provided with elements which simulate the power plant and accessories usually found on the chassis of a regular automobile, i. e. the engine, clutch, propeller shaft, transmission, differential, and fuel tank may be
- 45 simulated in the cast piece forming the chassis. The present invention also contemplates the design of the chassis and body parts so that the body parts fit closely between the fender simulating elements of the chassis whereby the toy is
- 50 reinforced mechanically and the lines of the chassis and body parts merge to provide an improved appearance in the completed toy.

A further object of the present invention is to provide a chassis part having a design which prose vides notches or bearings to receive the axle

shafts so that these axle shafts may be secured in place by merely passing the same lengthways through the notches and securing the wheels on the axles.

Inasmuch as the toy has the wheels and axles 5 carried by the chassis, it may be provided with the accessories to more completely simulate the chassis of a full sized automobile. It is possible to readily decorate these enclosed chassis parts so that they will contrast with the decoration on 10 the finished or completed toy automobile. The chassis may be sprayed one color, then the body placed on top of the chassis and another color of paint sprayed on so that the completed toy car is of uniform color throughout when the body is removed. The hidden parts of the chassis have the original color.

Other and further objects of the invention will be apparent as the description proceeds.

The accompanying drawings show, for purposes of illustrating the present invention, two of the many embodiments in which the invention may take form, it being understood that the drawings are illustrative of the invention rather than limiting the same.

In these drawings:

Figure 1 is a top plan view of a chassis forming casting:

Figure 2 is an inverted plan view of the chassis casting of Figure 1;

Figure 3 is a longitudinal sectional view taken ³⁰ on the line 3-3 of Figure 1, parts of the body being shown;

Figure 4 is a transverse sectional view taken on the line 4-4 of Figure 3;

Figure 5 is a transverse sectional view taken on ³³ the line 5-5 of Figure 3;

Figures 6, 6a, and 6b are diagrammatic top plan views showing the steps of decorating the chassis and body part;

Figure 7 is an inverted plan view of a modified ⁴⁰ toy automobile;

Figure 8 is a section taken on the line 8-8 of Figure 7; and

Figures 9 and 10 are sections taken on the line 45 9-9 and 10-10 of Figure 8.

The chassis casting 10 shown in Figures 1 and 2 is designed to simulate a regular automobile with the body removed to display the chassis and power plant. It has front fender simulating portions 11 and 11a, and rear fender simulating portions 12 and 12a. The fender simulating portions are integral parts of the chassis forming casting and are connected together by running board simulating portions 13 and 13a. Tuese 55
